III. School Climate

School Safety Plan

Safety of students and staff is a primary concern of Beach School. To ensure student safety, supervision is provided on campus at all times. Staff from the Piedmont Parks and Recreation Department's Schoolmates Program, located on the Beach School Campus, supervise students on campus before and after school. Students are supervised during recess and lunch by certificated staff members and five yard supervisors. Visitors to the campus must register at the office prior to entering school grounds and a visitor's pass must be displayed at all times.

The **Comprehensive School Site Safety Plan** is reviewed and approved each fall by the School Site Council; revisions are shared immediately with all staff members. Key elements of the Safety Plan include emergency disaster procedures, codes of student behavior, and sexual harassment policies. The school is in compliance with all laws, rules and regulations pertaining to hazardous materials and state earthquake standards. The school's disaster preparedness plan includes steps for ensuring student and staff safety during a disaster. Disaster drills are conducted on a regular basis throughout the school year; fire drills are held once a month, and earthquake drills are conducted annually.

School Discipline Practices

Students at Beach School are guided by specific rules and classroom expectations that promote respect, cooperation, courtesy, and acceptance of others. The school's discipline philosophy promotes a safe school and a warm, friendly classroom environment, and demonstrates that good discipline is a solid foundation on which to build an effective school.

Parents and students are informed of discipline policies at the beginning of each school year through classroom orientation and individual student handbooks. Students are required to sign a form acknowledging that they have read and understand these rules. Appropriate behavior is encouraged through praise and motivational incentives, as well as assertive discipline and conflict resolution tools to further develop personal growth.

A Public Hearing was held in October, 2010 and it was determined that each school in the Piedmont Unified School District had sufficient and good quality textbooks and instructional materials and/or science laboratory equipment. All students, including English learners, are required to be given their own individual textbooks and/or instructional materials (in core subjects) for use in the classroom and to take home, if necessary. Additionally, all textbooks and instructional materials used within the District must be aligned with the California State Content Standards and Frameworks, with final approval by the Board of Education. All textbooks at Beach School are in adequate supply and in fair to excellent condition. The school and district place great emphasis on providing students with the most up-to-date, state-adopted textbooks and instructional materials.

Library

Beach School's fully automated library, staffed by a credentialed teacher-librarian and library assistant three days a week, is stocked with over 13,500 books and books on C/D tape, as well as DVD/VHS collections to supplement curriculum. A computer, connected to a district-wide network, is located in the Library. Each classroom visits the library at weekly, scheduled times; additionally, flexible scheduled spots are available to conduct research projects. Students also may visit the library at recess and at lunch.

Technology

Computer skills and concepts integrated throughout standard curriculum prepare students for technological growth and opportunities. Students receive computer-assisted instruction on a regular schedule, and each classroom at Beach School contains a minimum of three internet-connected computers. The school also has a twenty-two-station computer lab, which is staffed by a .9 Curriculum and Technology Specialist. Software programs utilized at the school develop critical thinking skills, technological skills and mathematical proficiency, and include the Read, Write and Type keyboarding program.

Homework

Beach School regards homework as a fundamental part of the learning process that helps to develop basic academic and study skills as well as promote student responsibility and self-discipline. Homework is assigned on a regular basis for all grade levels and major subject areas. Each teacher determines the appropriate level of homework for his or her students, and the intent is that students complete most work independently. Students are expected to complete their homework assignments tin a timely manner and to the best of their ability. Parents are encouraged to provide a supportive environment for homework activities and to review homework assignments with their student.

XI. Instructional Planning and Scheduling

School Instruction and Leadership

Leadership at Beach School is a responsibility shared between District administration, the Principal, instructional staff, students, and parents. Since 2008 primary leadership duties have been assumed by Ms. Julie Valdez.

The School Site Council, which consists of staff and parents, meets regularly to address programs and components that make up the school, discuss the effectiveness and appropriateness of the various programs and components relative to the goals of the school, and act as a communication liaison between the community and the school

Professional Development

Staff members build teaching skills and concepts throughout the year by participating in conferences and workshops. For the past four years, the District has annually offered three staff development days where teachers are offered a broad-based variety of professional growth opportunities in curriculum, teaching strategies and methodologies. Staff development topics for the 2009-10 school year included, but were not limited to, Differentiated Strategies, GATE training, Mathematics, and the teaching of Writing.

For additional support in their profession, teachers may enlist the services of the District's Beginning Teacher Support and Assessment (BTSA) facilitator and /or the Peer Assistance and Review (PAR) program.

Instructional Minutes

For the 2010-11 school year, the Beach School offered 174 days of instruction for grades K-5th. This school year the three elementary schools instituted a common planning time (CPT) schedule where all 1-5 grade children were dismissed at 1:45 every Monday. We instituted 2 full days for conferences in the fall and spring.
